



VILLISCA WINS HAWKEYE SEVEN CAGE TITLE

(FEBRUARY 27, 1947)

The Bluejays tripped Shenandoah here Friday night 51 to 42 to earn an undisputed Hawkeye 7 title. It is the first clear cut championship the Jays have won since the league was organized 17 years ago (1930). The 1937-38 basketball team shared a basketball championship with Creston.

The Jays won 11 conference tilts in the 1946-47 season while losing 1. Their conference win record exceeds by 3 games the school record for Hawkeye 7 tilts won in a single season. The team advanced to the District and won two games from Corning and Oceola. They were then qualified to play in the sub-state tournament. The Jays beat Abraham Lincoln 41-36 before losing to Atlantic by a score of 41-29.


Atlantic, Ia.—Two free throws in the sudden-death overtime Thursday night gave Manning a 55-53 edge over Villisca in the boys' Class A district meet.

Phil Knaack, whose 23 points paced Manning, sank the one for the winning twopoint margin with 30 seconds gone in the second extra period.

Russ Northup had tied for Villisca at 50-all with a basket six seconds from the end of regulation time. That climaxed a fourth-quarter surge that brought Villisca from a 42-34 deficit.

Manning will play Carroll at Jefferson Saturday night in the split district championship game.

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

The 58-59 team ended the Hawkeye Eight conference standings in 3rd place behind Atlantic and Creston. Our record was 10-4 in the conference. We swept through the Sectionals at Red Oak with wins over Cumberland-Massena, Corning, Red Oak and beat Tabor in the finals.

As a young teenager I was always impressed with Coach Paul Walljasper. To me he was what a coach and a leader of young adults should be. He always dressed with a sport coat and tie, never lost his temper and insisted on the team taking free throw practice before every game. Later when I had the occasion to coach youth basketball while stationed in West Germany I recalled those basic tenets. I guess to some extent he was a mentor and he influenced me in a positive manner as I am sure he did others as well. I have tried to locate him on several occasions but with no success. His coaching style of fast break, full court press or slow down allowed a team with smaller players to be a contender during his coaching tenure at VHS.



ARMORY HISTORY (Susie has provided a series of articles concerning the Armory. They have been published in the Villisca Review. They will be provided in this NL and future NL to keep all informed of the ongoing initiative to preserve the Armory) Susie Enarson

During the past year, you may have read in the Review or on the Villisca.com website about discussions to restore the Armory in Villisca.

The building is currently owned by Villisca Community Schools and is used almost daily by young people of all ages for basketball, volleyball and weightlifting practice. Some adults have been going in to walk this winter while the sidewalks are too icy for safety. The school also uses it for storage. However, with the school funding situation becoming more limited, there are no funds to make needed repairs and restoration.

Following a community meeting in late 2007, it was determined that there was interest in supporting a "Save the Armory" project. The community has received a bid by Invision, an architectural firm from Des Moines that proposes a fee of \$24,700 for project management, programming, schematic designs and renderings for the initial phase of the project. There have been some contributions and grants awarded toward this goal, but the total amount needed has not been reached.

There are currently several Horizons committees taking action to work on community projects, and one of these committees decided to take on the challenge of raising the remaining funds needed to do this study of the restoration of the Villisca Armory. There is currently a letter writing campaign with letters being sent by Villisca elementary students to some out of town alumni, encouraging them to make donations to this initial fund raising effort. There has been a good response to these letters and the students are excited when they learn that their letters have helped in this project.

To date, approximately \$4200 is needed to reach the amount of \$24,700. When this amount is raised, a permanent committee will be formed to take charge and make decisions about expenditure of these funds and the direction and scope of the project.

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The Town and Country Grocery Store

It was 1957 and I was one of the lucky town kids to have a job. If you didn't work on the farm or it wasn't de-tassling or haying season there wasn't much for us town kids to find for steady work. A few of us managed to mow lawns or get a job at one of the local gas stations in town, or like me, work at one of the grocery stores in town. There were several then. The Weiner's hired me as a bagger and general help at their original store which was on the NW corner of 3rd Ave and 6th Street. A recent visit to Villisca shows that the building is no longer there. I think their original store was called the Villisca Fruit and Grocery store. The people that I recall that worked there were, Mildred Hefflefinger, Irma Patterson, Howard Miller, and Walt Webster. The bagger complement was completed with Judd Nordyke and Richard Phillis. Of course, Ed and Tillie Weiner were ever present at the store. They were always exemplary in their attendance to the store and to their customers.

I usually worked on Saturdays, took a break on Saturday afternoons when business slowed and then was back by 5PM to be on hand for the Saturday evening business rush. I rode my bike back and forth to the store east down 6th Street from our house out on 5th Street. All of us were on hand to move the grocery store to the new building across the street at the NE corner of 3rd Ave and 6th Street. I remember the effort as a major task in cleaning out the old store and moving as soon as we could in order for the new "Town and Country" store to be opened on the next business day. There was a full basement under the old store and it was totally stocked with canned goods and other non-perishable items. If I recall, the move all happened at the end of the day on a Saturday night in 1958 and was completed on time for the next Monday when they would reopen. In those days the store was not open on Sunday nor were there many businesses that were open on Sunday. As a bagger I got to meet a lot of folks, knew them and their families and learned such things as responsibility, courteousness and reliability. Believe it or not a large part of Ed's business was based on delivery of groceries to the many customers around Villisca. Ed always had a good delivery truck that we could stack full of orders in wire baskets to be delivered. Tillie would receive the orders early in the morning, right them up and then the baggers would collect the items through out the store. Once enough orders were available then the delivery truck driver would make the rounds to the customers. This was a personal service at that time that the many citizens of Villisca enjoyed. I think at least two other stores in town also provided delivery service.

The Weiner family was extremely proud of their new store. I think at that time it was probably one of the newest and most modern stores in the area. We continued with the same type of routines in the new store and with the same employees. The condition of the store today is a testament to how well Ed took care of it during their ownership. Ed and Tillie's sons, Dik and Howard were available to help on the weekends and when home from college. Ed always managed to be in position near the front door to welcome customers and to exchange comments with them. Tillie was ever mindful and polite in every way to all of us and to their customers. They were an essential ingredient in the fabric of Villisca. They were appreciative of their customers and the town most certainly benefited from their devotion to their store, their family and to Villisca as a whole.

The History of the Villisca Armory, continued. Susie Enarson

As related in past news information, the town of Villisca built the Villisca Armory in 1912. There were active military units in Villisca at least as far back as 1877. The "Highland Blues" used the floor of the Opera House on 4th St as their drill floor before the erection of the current armory. From the beginning, the new building was used for many community events, stage shows, band concerts, dances, plays, graduations, etc. as well as for the local National Guard unit.

Among the many community events held in the armory, was the Class of 1916 graduation ceremony on May 25, 1916. Twenty-six members were granted their diplomas, including Sylvia Enarson, for whom the local elementary school was later named.

Just one month later, Captain C.J. Casey received notice that the local guard unit was called to assemble at the armory with orders placing them in federal service, anticipating further aggression on the Mexican border. This was no doubt the first time the unit had been activated since the armory was built.

On Sunday, June 25, 1916, the seventy-five members of Company F were called to assemble by the bugler at the Villisca Armory. From there, they were led to the depot by members of the Grand Army of the Republic, who more than fifty years earlier had also been mustered in to serve their country and by former members of the Villisca National Guard companies.

It was a festive gathering, with many townspeople out to support the troops, families gathered at the depot for final goodbyes and the train locomotive decorated with bunting and flags. The unit was sent to Camp Dodge for intensive training before they were sent to Texas to be involved in the "Border War".

Fred Humphrey, Former VHS Coach and Teacher



This issue of our Newsletter has devoted much of our space to basketball as well as the Armory. Most of us growing up in Villisca have vivid memories of the Armory and of course playing the

sports that we love and had the opportunity to play. From the time I played basketball on the court on the north side of the Lincoln building and through high school I loved the game. I think it has changed a lot since my day and the game has lost a lot of its finesse. It seems to be much more of a power sport than I recall. Even in elementary school I looked forward to the High school basketball season so we could go to the games. Playing those quick little games with the pull over red shirts and the controlled chaos, dribbling up and down the court and perhaps getting a chance to make a shot, brought real excitement for the youngsters in Villisca. Those games could not have lasted more than 5-10 minutes but it was our chance to be in the big boy arena.

I looked forward to playing at the Junior and Senior High levels, which brings me to my thoughts about Fred Humphrey. I remember him as a stern but straight forward coach. I never had the chance to be in any of his classes as I think he left Villisca after my Freshman year, in 1957. During those years he was the varsity coach, but as we started practice in the fall he was the guy blowing the whistle during those gut wrenching drills on the floor of the Armory. I remember him refereeing and umpiring many of the games that I played in both football and basketball.

After leaving Villisca he made quite a mark on the recreation world and those accomplishments extracted from his obituary are included here. He went on to receive a Masters degree at University of Iowa and later had a Doctorate bestowed upon him from Penn State University. Little may have been known in Villisca about Dr. Humphrey's background, completing his bachelors degree from Tarkio college after service in WWII and receiving debilitating wounds in the Battle of Bastogne while serving in the 14 Armored Division's 19th Infantry Battalion. A crippled arm led him to develop his own rehabilitation program. Before he came to Villisca he was offered a chance to try out for the New York Knickerbockers as he was an outstanding player in High School and College. He declined in order to pursue his chosen career path. He developed expertise in therapeutic recreation. He devoted 45 years of his life to teaching and mentoring in the parks and recreation profession. His early life experiences were instrumental in developing his zest for life and his love for therapeutic recreation. Some highlights of his career:

- After receipt of his Master's degree served as the first full time recreation and activities director and the State Institute in Clarinda Iowa
- Director or State Activity Therapies at Jamestown North Dakota
- Activity Director, Mental Health Institute, Mt. Pleasant Iowa
- Pursued and received Doctorate degree at Penn Statue University while also serving as "instructor in charge" of therapeutic recreation.
- Developed similar programs at Temple University and Maryland University
- Consulted for University of Kentucky, University of Illinois and the University of North Carolina
- Two time president of the National Therapeutic Recreation Society
- 17 Years served as the Department Chairman at the University of Maryland for Parks, Leisure and Recreation.
- Received Distinguished honors from National Therapeutic Recreation Society, Pennsylvania Recreation and Park Society, National Recreation and Park Ethnic Society for outstanding contributions to graduate education.

Serving on the Parks and Recreation Commission in my fair city in Arizona I received a subscription to the National Parks and Recreation magazine. I was surprised to open it in 1994 and see a feature article and obituary of Dr. Fred Humphrey. The last I remember of him was that he had left Villisca to work in Clarinda . There were a lot of good things said about him and I have included some of the remarks concerning his career as an educator in this article. He didn't have a long tenure in Villisca as I recall. I suspect most teachers used Villisca as a career path to higher paying jobs while gathering solid experience. One of his former graduate students stated that he was "intolerant of the intolerant" That is quite a complement for one's character
